Parking on Campus

Parking on campus has always been difficult but the challenges increase daily. Parking is being pushed to the perimeter of campus. When you need to come to campus, consider the following tips:

- 1) Come early. The more convenient lots fill up well before 8am.
- 2) Study the UK parking site before you come.

3) Purchase a couple of “employee” scratch-off parking permits online or go to the parking office at 721 Press Ave in Parking Structure #6. Tell the attendant that you are a UK employee so that they will punch the “E” lot option. http://www.uky.edu/transportation/parking-permits_scratch-off-permits

4) Campus bus system: The campus bus system is actually pretty good. You can ride it free but you must make sure that the bus is marked Route 14-Blue Route or White Route. The Blue Route travels counter clockwise. The White Route goes clockwise. To see the route: download My Stop or TransLoc to your phone. You can see where the buses are in real time.

5) Park in a lot located on the Lex Tran bus system and ride the bus in. An example is to park at the Walmart Store at Man O’War and Nicholasville Rd. Catch the Lextran bus in to campus, about a 15 minute ride. Look at the bus schedule for departure times <http://www.lextran.com/>. If you show your UK ID card to the driver you can ride for free; otherwise, you’ll need to have a dollar bill or change ready when you board. (You won’t get change back.)

Journal Article of the Month

Journal Article of the Month

This month's featured journal article is entitled "*The Developmental Importance of Success and Failure Experiences at Summer Camp.*" This article presents an interesting and provocative perspective on the importance for youth attending summer camp to have both positive and negative experiences. Both positive and negative experiences are essential to learning and life-skill development. However, steps must be taken by camp staff (both full-time, professional, and volunteer) to ensure that youth learn from these experiences and have perseverance and coping skills to make the most of these situations. Young people learn from success *and* failure. However, success and failure can also impede development. In camp settings, success or failure are often more subjective and less dependent on objective performance indicators such as grades, wins, or losses. Therefore, the primary aim of this study was to use summer camp as a context to describe youths' appraisals of success and failure experiences and their associated development. Findings explain how success *and* failure at camp can contribute to the positive development of self-efficacy, effective coping, and perseverance.



The findings of this research describe youths' appraisals and responses to success and failure experiences at camp. Success and failure experiences predominantly occurred in activity- or social-centric situations in program settings. Dedicated efforts by camp staff to help youth reappraise and frame failure experiences as an opportunity for learning may help encourage positive and productive responses to failure. With this additional effort from camp staff, summer camps may be fertile settings for youth to learn from a balance of success and failure experiences. Implications for practice are recommended to help camp staff support young people through failure experiences and to maximize the positive developmental potential of both failure and success at camp.

The National Fish and Wildlife Foundation and the Wildlife Habitat Council, in cooperation with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, USDA Forest Service, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, FedEx, and Southern Company are pleased to solicit applications for the 2018 Five Star and Urban Waters Restoration program. The Five Star and Urban Waters program will award approximately \$2 million in grants nationwide.

Projects include a variety of ecological improvements along with targeted community outreach, education and stewardship. Ecological improvements may include one or more of the following: wetland, riparian, forest and coastal habitat restoration; wildlife conservation, community tree canopy enhancement, water quality monitoring and storm water management.
